May I take this opportunity through the pages of this our first newsletter to thank you all for what we have achieved over the last 13 years, culminating in the magnificent figure that has been donated and invested in the Cheshire Mark Benevolent Fund.

This fund was started in 1990 from humble beginnings to a fund now envied by many. The value of the fund as this report is written is in the region of £300,000.

The capital invested is made up of Lodge donations, Personal donations, Donations from Dinners and functions from the highly successful Salmon lunches both at Woodford and at Neston. The donations received from the Salmon lunches since their inception in 1990 is over £30,000. Of equal importance is the 1000+ Club which has been so successfully run by W.Bro.Alan Smith. The

club has, since its inception, raised over £33,000 towards the Provincial Mark Benevolent Fund. I urge you to continue your marvelous support.

As you know, only the interest from the invested capital is used for needy causes, and as a result of an underspend two years ago, the amount distributed last year was over £20,000 covering grants to non Masonic Charities, Masonic Charities and to Brethren in relief of their distress.

If you know of any needy cause that may be sourced from the fund, or indeed a brother in need, please contact your Charity Steward who now has a new user friendly application form and information to help in its completion.

The Degree was once part of a series of ceremonies e.g. Past Master, Link, Wrestle and even the Royal Arch itself. As to how Mariner Lodges were originally "moored" (now attached) to Mark Lodges, this would, and does, take a book to describe.

Starting September 2003, a new initiative is being adopted; handing a leaflet to a Mark Brother when he receives his Mark Grand Lodge certificate to enable him to quickly further his "daily advancement". I ndeed, the Provincial Grand Master and the Assistant both took this course - it was the first "chair" into which they were ever installed!

The R.A.M. degree is frequently coupled with another for the evening, i.e. a Mark or Allied. Nonetheless, it has established itself as a significant contributor to the Cheshire Provincial Mark Benevolent Fund raising the magnificent sum of £27,000+. Know Your Cheshire Mark Festival Jewel



This feature is intended to introduce brethren to the Mark Festivals held in the Province of Cheshire and the jewels issued. The first festival for the Mark Benevolent Fund held in Cheshire was in 1885. The two jewels reproduced below are the standard 1885 Stewards Jewel and the Honorary Festival Presidents Jewel issued to Lord Egerton of Tatton as President of the Festival. This jewel was recently recovered from a private collection in Canada and returned to Cheshire. The turning point in history for the MBF came in 1885, and it came for two reasons. A record Festival and the establishment of an Annuity Branch for the fund.

The 17th annual festival was held at Crystal Palace on July 22nd under the Presidency of the PGM for Cheshire, R.W.Bro.The Rt.Hon.The Lord Egerton of Tatton, the


Deputy Grand Master. The fantastic total was £1.721 16s and was the direct result of Lord Egerton's own efforts and the largest board of Stewards recruited at the time, 87 in total (the total in 1884 was £884 with 47 Stewards).

It is interesting to note that the stock from which the MBF derived it's income was held by the Trustees of Grand Mark Lodge - M.W.Bro.The Lord Egerton of Tatton, M.W.Bro.The Earl of Euston and R.W.Bro.Frank Richardson.

Handfield Jones in his work on the History of the MBF says of Egerton's achievement 'The result was not only a record but the first to exceed £1,000.00 and was over double the previous best'. Brethren, a landmark to say the least when you consider that at the time the Province had just 8 Mark Lodges!!



A Profile of Ashton District TI Lodge of MMM



Ashton District TI Lodge of Mark Master Masons is the oldest and most senior Mark Lodge in the Province of Cheshire. Proof exists of its working in 1830 and there is strong evidence indicating its existence as far back as the 1790's.

ADTI as it is known today, has a unique history steeped in colour and intrigue, and is well known during the 19th Century for having been a travelling Mark Lodge, commonly meeting on Sunday afternoons in some thirty Craft Lodges in the Provinces of Cheshire, Lancashire, Yorkshire and Derbyshire. As a consequence, it was commonly known as the Sunday travelling lodge.

Its members were not impressed when the Grand Mark Lodge was formed in

1856. This was no doubt due to the fact they were not invited to attend any of the planning meetings. They immediately formed their own Grand Lodge, having the title 'The Honourable United Grand Lodge of Mark Master Masons of the Aston-u-Lyne District'! They even went as far as to support other Lodges, including Joppa Mark in Birkenhead, where they 'Inducted' all of Joppa's Founders. They have the accolade of being the last Sovereign Grand Body to have recognised Grand Mark Lodge in 1900, when they submitted to its authority at a special moveable Grand Mark Lodge held at Dukinfield, where it continues to meet today.

Following a further one hundred years of service to Mark Masonry, in 2000, ADTI celebrated the Centenary of its Reconstitution, in the presence of the Provincial Grand Master, R.W.Bro. Benjamin Addy, now Assistant Grand Master. Today the lodge flourishes and shines a bright beacon for Cheshire as being fifth in the role of some eighteen hundred Mark lodges under the authority of the Grand Lodge of Mark Master Masons of England and Wales and its Districts and Lodges Overseas. We wish the Lodge and its members well.
