Success in the Quarries

Tucked away in the south eastern extremities of the Province is the town of Congleton, renowned for the fine quality of the sands and minerals quarried nearby. Closer to the centre of the town is the Masonic Hall, equally renowned for the fine quality of its activity in the quarries.

The Hall is home to Eaton Mark Lodge 1607, which celebrates its 20th anniversary this year. The Lodge has attracted a steady flow of new members since its foundation, however, during the period 1998 to 2001, the number of masons seeking advancement declined. This, coupled with deaths and resignations, left at the end of 2001 a small, but viable lodge membership – a situation which we all felt needed to be improved. The situation has improved, and this short article describes the reMARKable change in lodge fortunes.

The starting point for the transformation was that we all felt able to talk openly with each other about the situation – the future lay in our own hands. It was apparent during discussion, that the lodge has a number of major assets:

- a beautiful Masonic Hall, steeped in tradition, and rich in ambience
- an active membership which attends regularly, and enjoys itself
- membership drawn from more than one location (not just the same familiar faces)
- very competitive pricing for the social board, and drinks
- a large number of good ritualists
- a culture of respect both for and from the senior members of the lodge, also recognition that rank is not everything
- a team of officers that works well together
- no 'hang ups' about lodge traditions
- a secretary who works tirelessly for our benefit

Recognition that the lodge had a huge amount to offer to prospective members meant that the job of 'selling' the idea of advancement to potential members was easier (the fact that the WM and IPM are both salesmen is purely coincidental!). Coupling our assets with the Mark degree being promoted as the 'friendly degree' made the task easier still. We went out selling, armed with a candidate winning proposal.

Since February 2002, the lodge has advanced 8 candidates, and admitted 1 joining member. Most of the candidates have come from Macclesfield and Congleton, however, we are now attracting members from the Middlewich area too. This year we had to undertake a double advancement to ensure we stayed on top of the workload (a yellow hard hat was donned at one point during the ceremony by the WM – with so much activity in the quarries, health and safety should be paramount!).

We have taken tremendous care to make sure that our ceremonies are conducted in such a way that the candidates really feel part of the proceedings – some Oscar winning performances from our overseers this year, have played a major role in helping our new members feel relaxed improving their enjoyment of the advancement ceremony.

A Novice to Mark Masonry

I was fortunate to realise that although I had been a Craft Mason for some 37 years, there was another step to take - joining Mark Masonry!

The virtues of Mark Masonry had been extolled to me over the years but, like many others, I had commitments and was content with my Craft and Royal Arch membership

I had the privilege to be proposed into Joppa No.11 (TI) Mark Lodge some two and a half years ago and I progressed rather quickly, taking the chair this April 2004. I found that the amity and friendship in Mark Masonry is exceptional and I now have more good friends, which I would otherwise have never met.

The Lodge has had a chequered history, in 1872 Joppa was at it's zenith, however in the period 1880 to 1889 it was at a very low ebb and the membership was struggling. Nevertheless, it recovered in 1889 and continued to remain strong through both World Wars, again to decline to a level just workable. The Lodge has now recovered and is steadily progressing, with two more candidates this year (it must be due to the good looking Master!) both of which are attached to the Undertaking profession. No comments please!!

You will appreciate the age of the Lodge and the determination of the past and present members who are so very keen to promote one of the oldest Mark Mason's Lodge's in Cheshire. Like all Mark Lodges the Joppa Lodge No.11(TI) is extremely happy and vigorous and I am sure that if the Craft brethren have the opportunity to read "The Cheshire Mark Mason" newsletter, they too will see the opportunities of extending their knowledge and delight in achieving yet more from their masonry.

The money will be used to buy much needed equipment. Two Cheshire Hospitals have benefited - North Cheshire with £44,607 and with the second largest overall donation - Wirral Hospital NHS Trust £107.411!!!

Lodge Names

Following a recent visit by the Provincial Team to Walter de Hereford Mark Lodge No 1275 I was asked by several visitors "what was the derivation of the Lodge name?". The Lodge was founded in 1963. The founders found it difficult to find a name for the Lodge which suited everybody, but special circumstances solved the problem. King Edward I on his return from the wars founded in 1277, at Vale Royal, the largest Cistercian Abbey ever built. In the King's Chamberlain's accounts in the British Museum it is recorded that **Walter de Hereford was the Chief Overseer** who examined the work and paid the workmen their wages. It would be interesting for the derivation of other Lodge names to be explained so why not put pen to paper and let us all be enlightened.

Stamford Mark Lodge No.148

The Stamford Mark Lodge No. 148 was consecrated at Altrincham Town Hall on 15th July 1872. Seven Masons including the first Master, W.Bro. James Arthur Birch, had the honour of being Founders. So intense was the interest in the Mark Degree during this early period, that no less than three emergency meetings swelled the numbers to over 30 before the end of 1872.

The birth of Stamford Mark Lodge saw the number of Mark Lodges in Cheshire rise to five, the others being Ashton District, Joppa, Benevolent and Fidelity. It seemed to the local Senior Mark Masons, that with the additional Mark Lodges in North Wales, and no doubt due to the threat caused by the Supreme Grand Chapter of Scotland warranting Mark Lodges and Provincial Grand Lodges in Northern England, that it was eminently desirable to establish a Mark Provincial Grand Lodge in Cheshire, under the English Constitution, as soon as possible.

And so the Stamford Mark Lodge came to prominence again, at another emergency meeting held on 5th April 1873, it had the honour of hosting the consecration of the Provincial Grand Lodge of Mark Master Masons of Cheshire and North Wales, where the Hon. Wilbraham Egerton was Installed as the first Provincial Grand Master, by RW Bro William Romaine Callender, the Mark Provincial Grand Master of Lancashire, and six Brethren of Stamford Mark, were invested as Acting Provincial Officers. Making progress from such a successful start was not easy. In1875 the lodge numbers began to decline and during the 1880's a number of meetings were abandoned. In 1891, things changed and the ten years leading up to the death of Queen Victoria saw no less than 55 advancements.

The Lodge had its ups and downs during the twentieth century, as most others have, but met continuously, with only one meeting suspended, throughout both war periods and continued to do its duty in supporting the charities so well. During its long life, it has boasted a number of eminent Masons within its numbers, including the Hon Alan de Tatton Egerton (later 3rd Lord Egerton of Tatton), Bro. George Leigh OBE and Bro. F. Broadsmith.

In 1947, a number of Lodge members petitioned Grand Mark Lodge to establish a Royal Ark Mariner Lodge, to be moored to the Stamford Mark Lodge, resulting in the Consecration of The Stamford RAM Lodge No. 148 on 7th May 1948. In 1991, some 119 years after its founding, the Lodge was proud to celebrate its Centenary, the lateness being due to the abandoned meetings in 1880's falling foul of Grand Lodge's requirement for "regular" meetings, when determining qualification for a Jubilee or Centenary.

In 1966, the Lodge moved its meeting place, from Altrincham, to Sale Masonic Hall where it meets today. We wish the Stamford Mark Lodge No. 148 and all its members well with continued prosperity into the new Millennium.

What No Ham?

The Royal Ark Mariner degree has different levels of understanding and here is a brief but interesting interpretation. Noah had three Sons, Japeth, Shem and Ham.

Noah (knower) is a word related to Nous or intelligence and therefore the Higher Mind or Wisdom.

Japheth represents the Japhetic or European race of peoples and the word Europe taken from the ancient Indo European languages means 'good form'. Europe is the home of invention and science and can be seen as the head in the Northern Hemisphere, therefore Japheth can be related to the head or level of ideas in man.

Shem is the Semetic or mid zone with stress on the feeling and emotional levels.

Ham has definite links with the Hamitic races of North Africa and is the source of good Jazz rhythms.

Japheth, Shem and Ham correspond with the three levels in man Head, Heart and Belly. Perhaps Ham still needs to remain hidden as it can represent the hot, dark energies which are best concealed. It also represents a primitive form of the Will. It can be seen that this level best remains hidden and refined through ritual and work on the higher centres.
