£1.6m Donation from the Grand Lodge of Mark Master Masons for new Tamar Class RNLI Lifeboat

A dream has been realised for the RNLI crew at Angle recently, when the station's modern new Tamar class lifeboat arrived at its new home and was dedicated by The Grand Master HRH Prince Michael of Kent. The RNLI's most technologically advanced lifeboat will reach casualties faster and help the volunteer crew save even more lives at sea. It is now officially placed in service, the crew having completed an intensive training programme.

The arrival of the Tamar is the culmination of three years of fundraising, which RNLI supporters began so effectively at grass-roots level in Birmingham and Pembrokeshire following an appeal launched in 2006.

A £1.6M donation from the Grand Lodge of Mark Master Masons, the largest individual donation ever made by the Mark Benevolent Fund, completed the task to foot the bill of the £2.7M lifeboat. The significant donation has given Grand Lodge the right to name the lifeboat, which was duly called 'Mark Mason', during the dedication ceremony in June.

Angle is the second RNLI lifeboat station in Wales to take delivery of a Tamar class lifeboat, the first being Tenby, which welcomed Haydn Miller into service in 2005. The Angle RNLI crew collected their new lifeboat from the RNLI's headquarters in Poole and following a passage through Weymouth, Plymouth, St Mary's and Padstow, they arrived in Angle recently.

The Tamar class is the latest design of RNLI all-weather lifeboat and features cutting edge technology to enhance its lifesaving capabilities. The new lifeboat replaces the station's Tyne class all-weather lifeboat, which was built in 1986. Compared to the Tyne,

the Tamar is bigger - 16 metres as opposed to 14 - and faster, with a speed of 25, rather than 17 knots.

John Allen-Mirehouse, RNLI Lifeboat Operations Manager at Angle says: 'This is a very exciting day for the volunteer RNLI crew at Angle and a momentous occasion for the station. We are extremely proud to be the second of the RNLI's 31 lifeboat stations in Wales to take delivery of this fantastic boat and seeing her arrive in the distance was quite a moment for everyone. As a charity, the RNLI is eternally grateful to everyone who has given so generously to make this dream a reality.'

Extensive modifications have been carried out to the boathouse and the slipway to allow a new larger lifeboat to operate. The re-profiled slipway was put to the test in December when a relief Tamar was put through its paces to ensure everything was operating correctly, in anticipation of the arrival of the new boat.

Mr Allen-Mirehouse adds: 'Last year, the Angle all-weather RNLI lifeboat launched 25 times and rescued 21 people. A large proportion of call-outs for the volunteer RNLI crew at Angle are to vessels in trouble a long way from the shore. Angle's crew spent 72 hours at sea during 2008 and many shouts were long towing operations. The Tamar class lifeboat is not only faster which will ensure the lifeboat is able to reach casualties quicker, but it is more comfortable and safer.'

The Tamar has more safety features built in to protect the crew, including a new seat design that will reduce loadings on crew members' spines in rough weather. A new on board computer known as SIMS (Systems and Information Management System) further improves safety because a lot of the lifeboat's functions can now be managed remotely. This means the crew do not have to move around the boat while underway, reducing the risk of accidents. Using SIMS also allows better task sharing between crew members, as the various functions required to operate the lifeboat can be accessed via screens at any of the six crew positions.

Provincial Meeting Goes From Strength To Strength

This year's Annual Meeting of the Provincial Grand Lodge, held at Ellesmere Port, was again a great success. On this occasion, the Meeting was honoured by the presence of the Assistant Grand Master, RWBro Benjamin Addy. The following is a summary of the two main speeches at the meeting.

Précis of the Provincial Grand Master's Speech on 21st March 2009:

The PGM stated that Membership remained a priority and he was proud that, for 8 years, membership had remained quite constant. Recruitment into the Mark and RAM continued at a level commensurate with progress and has averaged in excess of one new member per Lodge. However, resignations, particularly in the Mark Degree, had increased, resulting in a net loss. The role of the Lodge Almoner in these circumstances was crucial - his priority must be to maintain contact with those whose attendance at Lodge is infrequent and whose commitment may be wavering.

Due acknowledgement was accorded to WBro Alan Smith who for 20 years has worked tirelessly for CPMBF and other charities. The PGM mentioned four Lodges, Tarporley, Stamford, Ashton District TI, and Eaton which received commemorative Overseers Mauls in recognition of contributions of £6,000.

Of the Provincial Team visits, perhaps the highlight of the year was the Centenary of Stayley Mark Lodge No.597. Other highlights included the Golden Jubilees of VW Bros William Noel Ashton, Gwilym Roberts, Bill Hopwood and WBro Sydney Alfred Jones, however, even these were eclipsed when WBro Jim Todd celebrated his Diamond Jubilee. Sadly VW Bros Gwilym Roberts and Bill Hopwood have since been called to Higher Service.

The separate RAM Assembly on March 2nd had been a great success and as less than 50% of Mark Masons were in the RAM degree, those not in RAM were encouraged to join.

2009 appointees to Provincial Grand Rank were made aware of their responsibilities and the outgoing team thanked for their industry. Thanks were also accorded to the Clay Lane secretariat and all within and outwith the order.

Précis of the Assistant Grand Master's speech:

After thanking the PGM for his kind invitation, the Assistant Grand Master recalled that seven years ago, as PGM he "predicted the approach of a new dawn, with a splendid sunlit upland awaiting the brethren of this Province, under a new Provincial Grand Master and with fresh and younger minds willing to face, with confidence, the future." He had not been disappointed and stated "being back with you is, for me, one of the most moving and thrilling moments in my Masonic Life."

As Assistant Grand Master he stated that "the Province of Cheshire stands today without rival, highly respected throughout the constitution. Its commitment and support to Grand Lodge is legendary and, under the leadership of your Provincial Grand Master, its opinions are not only highly respected but are actively sought. Do not, therefore, be led away by any fair-seeming appearances of fortune but rather put your trust in those deep, slow-moving tides that have borne you thus far already and will surely bear you forward still."

He then presented the PGM with a Provincial Keystone Jewel, delivering a homely anecdote of the one he had "borrowed" from a neighbouring Province.

In thanking the PGM for his very kind thoughts in inviting him to the Provincial meeting, and also the brethren for their very kind reception, he concluded by stating:

"Finally, brethren, may this Province long continue to prosper and may you all never fail in your zeal for our order. Let every Mark Mason within the Province act now in accordance with what he thinks is his duty, in harmony with his heart and conscience and with his brethren of every rank and title. May God bless you brethren and may God bless this Province.

RAM Provincial Meeting - A First for the RAM !!

On the second of March 2009 the first ever Cheshire Royal Ark Mariner Assembly was held at Cheshire View, with the PGM, his Deputy and Assistant, the Provincial Grand Director of Ceremonies and many of the Provincial team in attendance, together with some 130 plus RAM brethren, including those receiving Provincial Grand Rank.

In his address the PGM stated that the idea of this assembly had been in mind for a while as he considered that the RAM was unfairly cast as the poor relation to the Mark degree instead of the beautiful and important degree that it is, which is much loved by those who are members of it.

The PGM then went on to say that the strength of this Province is the collective strength of its members and that the members enthusiasm is the catalyst for the success of the Province and the durability and nature of its Lodges. He continued with an assessment of the membership trends, pointing out the importance of support to both new and "wavering" members. He also commented that sharing the ceremonial work may well be the most elegant way in overcoming the difficulty of finding time to learn our rituals that some brethren experience these days. He added that it behoves us all to embrace the responsibilities implicit in our acceptance of any office and that the dignity of our ceremonial is part of those responsibilities.

The PGM then went on to thank those RAM Lodges who are now the proud owners of three mauls for the generosity of their contributions to the CPMBF and observed that he had been delighted to present the Sincerity Lodge of RAM's with their 150th Anniversary Keystone Jewel, the first to a RAM Lodge in the Province. Following this he paid tribute to the Secretariat at Clay Lane and the Provincial team for their invaluable, and rarely recognised contributions to our work.

The PGM then invested those selected for promotion to Provincial Grand Rank.

An excellent and relaxing Festive Board was enjoyed by some 129 of those attending and the proceedings adjourned until 6.00pm on the 14th January 2010 when the next RAM Assembly will take place once again at Cheshire View, Christleton.

The work required took quite a few weeks to complete as it was part of the complete organ case restoration.

An invitation was received from Michael Holmes, director of music at the Chapel to attend a dedication service on Sunday 28th June 2009. The Deputy Provincial Grand Master, along with Mrs. Alldred and members of Mark Lodges in the Hyde area were happy to attend the morning service, during which the work on the organ was dedicated and the donation from Mark Masonry in Cheshire was acknowledged.

Following an application from Hyde Chapel, Gee Cross, Hyde, Cheshire, for help with the restoration of the historical organ case pipes, Cheshire Provincial Mark Benevolent fund made a grant of £1000.00 towards the cost of this restoration.

The history of Hyde Chapel goes back to before 1708, when the congregation built the first Christian place of worship in Hyde. A new church replaced the former building in 1846. This second chapel, which houses the organ which Cheshire Mark Masons have helped to refurbish, is a noted local landmark, and is also a Grade II, listed building.
