NEW WARDENS TAKE THEIR SEATS


HOWARD WADDELL, right, who was invested as the Province's new Senior Warden at the Annual Meeting on March 21, is very much a Stockport man. He was born in the town, still lives in the Bredbury area, and his Masonic roots there go deep.

He took his first steps in the fraternity in 1985, joining Norbury Lodge No.5656 which amalgamated with mother lodge Cheadle to become Cheadle Norbury Lodge No.3731 in 2006. Ten years after his initiation he entered mark Masonry, being advanced into the degree in Composite mark Lodge No. 1005 of which he became Worshipful Master in 2001.

His first Provincial appointment followed in 2006 when he was invested as a Steward and that was followed by promotion the following year to Past Provincial Junior Grand Deacon and he was made a Past Provincial Grand Junior Overseer in 2011. That was the year when Composite surrendered its warrant and he then became a joining member of Cornwall Legh No.839.

It was Cornwall Leigh that he had looked to when he decided to become a member of the Royal Ark Mariner Degree, being elevated into that degree in 2002. He was installed in the Commander's chair in 2009 and was promoted to RAM Provincial Grand Rank at the Assembly at Christleton in January.

He has been married to his wife, Janet for 39 years and they have two sons and three grandchildren. He says: "I am now retired, having worked in Diesel engineering for Mirrlees Blackstone Ltd (which is now part of MAN Diesel Ltd) for 40yrs. Resignations a concern

OUR membership in Cheshire fell by 23 last year a reduction of just under 2%. Whilst this is small it is the 63 resignations which are of most concern and I ask all Lodges to investigate fully the reasons for a Brother leaving our Order and ask them to make retrieval of him a priority. The recruitment of new members to our order is not however even across all Lodges, whilst some manage two or three advancements or joining members per year, other have had 2- 3 fallow years. I encourage those Lodges who have found themselves in this position to make strong links with more than one Craft Lodge so that they increase the base from which they draw and have a wider range of members.

The most disturbing report I had from one young Brother was when I asked why he had not joined the Mark, he said "I find that those in my Craft Lodge who ioin other orders loose interest in the Craft Lodge" Now I know that this is not true of us all but we have to take care that the impression we give in our Craft Lodges is one of enthusiasm and commitment. We will then be a worthy example for that young man to follow.

THE Cheshire Mark Weekend has become an established part of our social season and our visit to Kenilworth last May was a very happy event. This year we look forward to taking even more of our number to Stratford upon Avon. My thanks go to the organizing committee who find interesting venues and organize not only good food and a friendly atmosphere but also produce a substantial contribution to our Mark Charities. When this is added to your generosity to our CPMBF whether by direct giving, 1000+ Club or by supporting the Salmon Lunches it has enabled us to make donations of £42,327 to deserving causes in Cheshire, The Mark Benevolent Fund by way of donations to current Festivals and a further £5000 in support of the Cheshire Craft 2016 Festival.

We are now aware that Cheshire will be responsible for the Mark Festival of 2024 and whilst it is not intended to launch this festival at this early stage, you will begin to see the redirection of funds from our Cheshire Charity to this festival in these early years starting with an initial donation of £17000 which is shown in this year's accounts. I have invited W Bro. Bob McMillan to chair a Festival Committee and W Bro. David Heathcote to be his Deputy Chairman. Both have enthusiastically accepted my invitation and we will begin to make plans for a festival in 2024.
