CPMBF MAKES A BIG DIFFERENCE

THE Cheshire Provincial Mark Benevolent Fund it will be suitable for Aash for 6-7 years. has brought some welcome sunshine into the life of Malpas voungster Aash-Jai Ramouter-Evans.

The six-year-old suffers from Diplegic Cerebral Palsy, is in constant pain, and relied on a walking/standing frame to give him slight mobil- he enjoys his new freedom of movement and his ity until the Fund stepped in to provide him with a state-of-the-art wheelchair that is making a remarkable change to his quality of life.

Selective Dorsal Rhizotomy, a procedure which involves cutting nerves in the spine to relieve the severe tightness in the legs, was needed but that was originally only available in America at a cost of £50,000.

The NHS started offering the procedure last year on a restricted basis and Aash was to be one vincial Grand Master, Austin Bamber and his of the patients, but, without warning, they sent a standard letter cancelling the arrangement, although it was still available with self-funding.

Aash's family had managed to raise £21,000 towards aftercare costs but had to contact all donors to ask if they would agree to their funding being used for the surgery instead, and the family then set about trying to raise a further £20,000 to cover the aftercare of which they have managed to obtain about £6,000 so far. To be effective the surgery had to be completed before the ninth birthday.

As an interim measure Aash had Botox injections in his legs but this was not successful.

Aash went into hospital last August for the SDR operation and remained there for a further three and a half weeks. The procedure was successful and now he has to have physiotherapy for wheelchair and the difference it has made is 18-24 months before a further spinal procedure for tendon-lengthening is undertaken.

The CPMBF was originally asked to help with upgrading a walking/standing frame, without which Aash was immobile and even with the frame was in constant pain. Eventually the manufacturers supplied an ex-demonstration model in co-operation with Shocklach School.

But after long consultation with the family and medical professionals, the Fund financed the purchase of a Hoggi-Cleo Sports wheelchair, specially manufactured in Germany for Aash and it was delivered in time for Christmas.

The wheelchair is of super-light construction with a great deal of adjustment in all its parts so

The benefits are already being felt and Aash is growing daily in confidence and strength. Once secured in the chair it is difficult to entice him out of it. His big smile is testament to how much ambition is to be a footballer. With his enthusiasm maybe a future Olympic medallist?

An official presentation was made at Christleton in January, when he was accompanied by his parents Mark and Shaileena, brother Ethan, Raj Ramouter, Heath Shingler and Sheetal Laxshmi, Manisha Grice and Tommy Shewharak, and Anu. Representing the Mark Province of Cheshire at this happy occasion were the Deputy Prowife Gillian, the Assistant Provincial Grand Master, Glyn Hewitt and his wife Sue, together with Colin and Joyce Hambleton, CPMBF Grant Administrator Alan Smith, David and Sandra Littler, Jim and Jan Hardman, Kishore and Ann Balgobin, Barry and Denise Travers, Ken Mayer, and Brian and Beverley Rose.

Austin Bamber made the presentation to Assh and his parents on behalf of the CPMBF and Aash was happy to demonstrate both his wheelchair skills and the strong bond with his siblings.

Although only six years old and with a long list of medical procedures ahead of him, Assh is a typical boisterous lad with a winning smile and a happy disposition and it gave all those present much pleasure to watch him in action.

His father says: "Aash is loving his new unbelievable, he is now taking part in PE in school and in school playtime, he is able to interact with all of his friends and play football and basketball."

Mark and Shaileena are well supported by family and friends but still have to work hard to provide all the extra cash needed to try and give Aash as good a life as possible.

The CPMBF is to be congratulated for all its efforts on Aash's behalf and, no doubt, there will be further need of support in the future.
